MIRPS REGIONAL ACTION PLAN 2024

Background

The Government of Belize presents the 2024 Regional Action Plan, based on the following documents as approved by the MIRPS States:

MIRPS Statutory Charter: The Statutory Charter is recognized as a set of non-binding rules that regulate and define the structure, roles, objectives, and scope of the MIRPS. The Charter establishes the regional and national technical teams as the main mechanisms for the implementation of the regional and national action plans. The Regional Technical Teams (former Working Groups) provide platforms for the MIRPS Member States to share experiences and knowledge, identifying joint solutions in different thematic areas that allow them to advance in the implementation of the regional and national plan (Art. 20). Moreover, at the national level, the MIRPS has National Technical Teams composed of government departments and public institutions responsible for planning, coordinating, monitoring, implementing, periodically reviewing, and consolidating National Action Plans and related commitments (Art.

27). The National Technical Teams aim to ensure a comprehensive response led by the State, with a general focus on providing protection and durable solutions for refugees, asylum seekers, internally displaced persons, and persons in need of international protection (Art. 28). The Charter also establishes the MIRPS Dialogue Mechanisms with the civil society, the private sector, and the academia (Arts. 34-38).

MIRPS Pledges as presented at the Global Refugee Forum: Under the leadership of Panama as the 2023 Protempore Presidency and through the MIRPS Regional Technical Teams that concretely address protection and solutions, MIRPS States worked together to develop four regional multi-stakeholder pledges that were presented at the 2023 Global Refugee Forum, to complement specific pledges at national or local level.





In support of the Multistakeholder Pledge on Asylum Capacity Strengthening and in the framework of the MIRPS Working Group on Strengthening Asylum Systems, MIRPS States commit to continue strengthening national institutions responsible for refugee status determination processes by improving technical capacities and developing national asylum procedures, systems, and practices that enhance efficiency, fairness, and quality, in accordance with the capacity and needs of each country and with the support and assistance of members of the MIRPS Support Platform, UNHCR, OAS, and other partnerships.

In support of the Mega-Pledge on Economic Inclusion and Social Protection, and in the framework of the MIRPS Working Group on Jobs and Livelihoods, the MIRPS countries commit to promoting the self-reliance of refugees and other displaced or stateless communities by facilitating access to decent work and entrepreneurship, through the employability mechanisms of involved government institutions; national legislation and relevant policies; and by facilitating the recognition of competencies, knowledge and skills, with the support and assistance of the members of the MIRPS Support Platform, and in partnership with the private sector and civil society.

In support of the Multistakeholder Pledge: Call to Action for Refugees and Migrants, and in the framework of the MIRPS Working Group on Local Governance, the municipalities that form the Group commit to promoting the leadership of local governments and strengthen coordination with relevant institutions to facilitate the integration at the local level of displaced persons, together with their host communities.

Statistical Inclusion In support of the Multistakeholder Pledge: Inclusion of Forcibly Displaced and Stateless Persons in National Statistical Systems and Surveys, MIRPS States commit to furthering systematic inclusion in data collection efforts, including through identification questions and solutions indicators in national population censuses and household surveys, as appropriate, to enable data disaggregation and reporting on forcibly displaced- refugees, asylum seekers, people with protection needs, internally displaced (as applicable) and stateless persons, with the support and assistance of members of the MIRPS Support Platform and other partnerships¹.

Panama City Declaration:

As adopted by the MIRPS States, this Declaration includes their commitment in working on:

- Responding to challenges due mixed migratory movements across the borders of Central America and Mexico, particularly in the Darien region.
- Collaboration aimed at identifying and addressing the root causes of displacement.
- Promoting the work of the MIRPS Regional Technical Teams.

- The four MIRPS Pledges as presented at the Second Global Refugee Forum.
- Protection of the human rights of accompanied and unaccompanied children and adolescents in mixed migratory movements and displacement, in accordance with international protection frameworks, guaranteeing the protection of the principle of the best interests of the child.
- Highlighting the work of the entities implementing the projects financed by the MIRPS Fund.
